Dear Parents/Guardians:

This time of year as many are getting their tax money back predatory lenders are looking for ways to help you spend it. A predatory lender is someone who uses unfair or abusive loan terms. They prey on the elderly, low income, and minorities. They look for people who are desperate. They can sometimes take the form of payday loans, car loans, tax refund anticipation loans or any type of consumer debt. So, how can you protect yourself against predatory lenders? The best way is to educate yourself against these practices. Stay clear of lenders who promise you an approved loan no matter what your credit and question fees and high interest rates. Do not sign any documents with blank spaces. These types of lenders prey on those that will have trouble repaying their loan because they will make their money off the additional late fees. Please, always check carefully into everything and never feel forced into a contract you are not sure about.

HOME LEARNING / FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Home Learning Activity:

Props for Pretending - Stock a box with supplies that encourage your child to imagine herself in different roles. Your child's thinking may expand as she dresses up to play various parts. Why this is important: You can encourage your child to use pretending as a way of trying out situations she/he has not yet experienced. Pretending with props lets her practice future situations and make decisions as well as expand her creativity. What you do:

- Help your child gather and store the props she needs to play different roles. If possible, store each set of props in a separate box.
- Keep the boxes where she can easily reach them on her own.
- Try a few of these examples to get started: A box with dolls, cloths, baby bottle, aprons, pans, spoons, book bag, notepad, keys, tools, measuring tape, safety goggles, bandages, blanket, toy thermometer, etc.

To be a parent, cook, office worker, builder, doctor or nurse, etc.

- Limit the contents of each box so that your child is not overwhelmed.
- Add to or change the items in the box as you find more appropriate props.
- Help your child get started: Can you think of a person who would use these pans and spoons?
- Another idea: At cleanup time, ask your child to help put each item back in the appropriate box. She/he will need to think about what each object is used for in order to determine where it belongs.

Family Engagement Activity:

Our Story -Tell a story to your child, pausing at several points to let him/her add some parts. Your child's creativity will blossom as he/she thinks of new ideas and tries them out in storytelling. Why this is important - Creative storytelling provides a safe opportunity for your child to try out new ideas. When he/she adds ideas, he/she can use his/her imagination to change the outcome of the story. Telling a story is good preparation for the later task of creative writing.

What you do:

- Invite your child to join you in telling a story. For the first few times, you may need to tell the majority of the story, only pausing occasionally to encourage him to add a word or sentence.
- Begin a story with simple details: Once upon a time, a little rabbit was hopping down the forest path. He looked up in an oak tree, and he saw...
- Pause for your child's idea, then continue with the details he provides: Down came the squirrel and said, "Let's go to the...." Continue the story this way.
- Tell short stories until he feels comfortable and confident with this storytelling format.
- Wait for him/her to offer more information about the characters and plot. He/she may provide more than just a oneor two-word answer after several practice stories. Prompt him by asking, Did anything else happen?
- Use this game with your child and other family members by letting them take turns adding to the story.
