

Things you can do at home to reinforce what we are learning at school:

Prepare your child for Kindergarten:

- -Read, Read, Read at least once a day. Ask your child lots of questions about what is happening in the story. This will work on comprehension and will give them lots of practice communicating.
- -Play lots of alphabet and number games. Look for number and letters around your house and neighborhood. Bring a clipboard and have your child practice writing letters, words and numbers.
- -Encourage your child to draw and make up stories about their drawings. Ask them about their pictures and write down their story. As you write their responses, read it back to them so that they learn that we can write down what we say.
- -Make a weekly visit to the library! Did you know that our local libraries provide school readiness activities during the summer. Call or check the website of your local library for their story time and crafting activity schedule.
