A)Read, Read and Rea to your baby.

What Are the Benefits of Reading to your Baby? an infant will not understand everything you are doing or why. But reading aloud to your baby is a wonderful, shared activity you can continue for years to come, and it is important for your baby's brain. Reading aloud:Teaches a baby about communication. introduces concepts such as numbers, letters, colors, and shapes in a fun way builds listening, memory, and vocabulary skills. Lives baby's information about the world around them by the time babies reach their first birthday they will have learned all the sounds needed to speak their native language. The more stories you read aloud, the more words your baby will hear and the better they will be able to talk. Hearing words helps to build a rich network of words in a baby's brain. Kids whose parents talk and read to them often know more words by age 2 than children who have not been read to. And kids who are read to during their early years are more likely to learn to read at the right time.

B). The month of July is a month of celebration. We will be learning about colors around us. We will mix colors. At learning time children will be pointing to the colors that they are wearing. We will count from 1-5. In arts and crafts we will be working on fireworks, finger paint, books related to colors.
