PARENT MEETING MINUTES

Meeting was brought to order by introducing parents and staff to the meeting. There were seven parents present for the parent meeting.

FA presented ice breaker questions to start the meeting. Parents and staff engaged in the questions of "If you could add anyone to Mount Rushmore, who would it be and why? and what was your least favorite food as a child and if you still hate it or now enjoy eating it? Policy Council minutes were presented: Policy Council:November Policy Council met via Zoom on November 18, 2021. Quorum was established with 15 community reps present. The October meeting minutes were approved. Budget Training was conducted by Kris Bates, CFO. Kris thanked each representative for their dedication and commitment to serve as being an active participant and representing the importance of being a part of their child's future. Mr. Bates explained how to read a Budget Revenue & Expense Variance Report. To the far right on the % left is what is left in expenses and revenue in the program term. Kris Bates explained that we plan to spend the funds that are allotted by the end of the grant period to reach 100%. When you see parenthesis in revenue you have collected more money than budgeted for. When you see this in expense it means we spent more money in that expense item than originally budgeted for. When seeing this in In-kind or match it means we received more donations, volunteers, or space than budgeted for and needed to match the grant which is a good thing. The Budget and Credit Card statements were approved. The Enrollment, Attendance and Snack reports were approved. Homebased Policy safety Precautions for Home Visitors, Group Socialization Agenda Outline, and Home Visit Format was presented by Amy Thomas and approved. All Service Area and Center Reports were approved. Staffing Reports were presented for information purposes. In other business policy council representative presented questions from parents If now that volunteers are permitted in the classroom are they required to be vaccinated. Heidi responded that vaccination is not required but being masked is. Heidi also recommended in a question regarding clothing options for parents and a diaper exchange each site to work with FA's at locations regarding a clothing exchange drop program. Heidi informed that we do not have a diaper exchange but the early learning coalition does provide them through a special grant to families enrolled in Early Learning Coalition and receiving School Readiness funds. Heidi informed that the staff do work with the community to get turkeys and food donated for families. Jennifer Fowler informed that FA's are out working in the community for partnership sponsors. At this point 100% of centers based and home based have been sponsored for Christmas. Any families willing to assist with working with FA's for sponsor assistance is appreciated. Seth Williams shared that the Grab N Go shelf stable meals are packed and at sites ready to go home with children during the Holiday week closure. Next Policy Council meeting is Thursday, December 16,

Teachers Erika Davis, Jodi Shelton and Wendy Raspberry provided parents on what was going on in the classrooms. Teachers discussed the arrival of Santa Clause next Wednesday on December 15th for children to ride on the sleigh with Santa and take photos. FA spoke on the Parent Curriculum topics of Self Care & Goal Setting and the importance of both topics. FA and teachers spoke on upcoming dates for Christmas and New Year's vacation which starts December 16th-January 4th.

FA spoke on how they are mandated reporters and how important it is to not leave children unattended in running vehicles with other children in the car while they run in for drop off, and that if they are seen placing children in any vehicle without proper child restraints they will be reported. If seen FA will ask that the child remain on premises with staff until proper restraints can be obtain and a call will be made. Information was provided at the parent meeting in regards to obtaining a child car seat. Questions & Answers: Parent and staff discussion on car seat issue, attendance, weekend meals.

Next Parent meeting is scheduled for January 13th 2022 4pm.



CHILDREN'S BOOK SUGGESTION

HOME LEARNING / FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Grab a bag of mini marshmallows. Try these low-prep activity ideas... 1) MARSHMALLOW COUNTING: Grab a hot cocoa mug and a number cube. Have your child roll the cube and add that many marshmallows to the mug. Keep rolling and adding until the mug is filled. If your child is ready count all the marshmallows in the mug at the end for an added challenge. 2) MARSHMALLOW BUILDING: Grab some flat toothpicks and have your child use marshmallows and toothpicks to build. Leave it openended and let them create anything they'd like or add some focus by building letters, numbers, or shapes. 3) MICROWAVE MARSHMALLOWS: Ask your child to predict what will happen if we heat up a marshmallow. Then test it out. Put the marshmallow on a plate in the microwave for a few seconds and watch closely. Discuss what happens first and then after the microwave is turned off. If you have large marshmallows compare the difference between the two. 4) MARSHMALLOW ART: Toward the end of the week grab some paper, glue and your marshmallows. Invite your child to make a picture by gluing marshmallows to the page.

POLICY COUNCIL UPDATES

December Policy Council met via Zoom on December 16, 2021. Quorum was established with 13 community reps present. Heidi Rand, requested a change to the agenda to place Denise Mercado, Inclusion Coordinator on the agenda to present a training on Inclusion. Denise explained the process of the Inclusion Team reviewing every screening conducted on children and then reviewed with families and referred when needed. The inclusion team educates parents on the entire referral process to empower them to advocate for their child. If a child is under 3 they are referred to our partner Early Steps. If the child is over 3 they are referred to our partner Fiddlers on the Hernando County side and Child Time in Volusia. These partners come directly onsite and work with the teachers and child in the Head Start classroom. The Inclusion team also goes directly into the classrooms to observe students and work with teachers to assist with strategies and material usage through modeling. Denise mentioned that a higher number of children on the autism spectrum are being seen and due to this the inclusion team is being proactive and going through an autism spectrum navigator training through UCF to provide the highest quality support. The November meeting minutes were approved. Amy Thomas, Deputy Director of Children's Services, introduced Michelle Hann the new Education Manager for Hernando/Sumter County. The Budget and Credit Card statements were approved. The Enrollment, Attendance and Snack reports were approved. Tanya Hall, Deputy Director of Program Services, presented the Recruitment Action Plan and was passed. Heidi Rand presented and discussed the Temporary COVID-19 Vaccination, Testing, and Face Covering Policy. She stressed that this is a temporary plan and subject to change and be put on hold based on any changes from the Office of Head Start. Following an open discussion the vote was 8 yes and 6 no. The majority passed the temporary policy. Seth Williams, Health Manager, stressed that all of our regular health prevention strategies and our procedures with students currently in place would not change if the temporary COVID-19 policy is to be implemented or put on hold. Heidi Rand presented the Criteria for Selection of Children for 2022-2023 program year and was passed. Staffing Reports were presented for information purposes.

All Service Area and Center Reports were presented and approved. Next Policy Council meeting is Thursday, January 27, 2022.
