### Message from your Family Advocate

#### 7 tips to make cooking with children easier for everyone:

- 1. **Keep it simple.** There will be a time for making mousse and soufflé, but it is not now. Cutting up a banana or ripe fig can be just as satisfying as preparing multistep desserts that require for precision.
- 2. **Let your child lead.** Does your child love fruit? Let them select the ingredients for fruit salad. Children are more likely to try things when they have control.
- 3. **Start with basics**. Think about the skills your child already has (can he/she cut playdough?) and needs (can he pour water into his cup?). Choose recipes that match their skill level. Make pretzels. Make popsicles.
- 4. **Build up.** Once they can cut fruit and pour liquid, you can combine those two skills into making smoothies.
- 5. **Introduce literacy!** Read books such as Stone Soup and then make soup. Write out the recipe with pictographs and your child can follow along, "reading" the recipe with you.
- 6. **Invite your child to help clean up.** Your child can "wash" plastic dishes in a bin of soapy water, sweep, and sponge up spills.
- 7. **Eat your results and enjoy.** Model healthy eating habits and your child may try them, too.

## Message from your Child Development Specialist

Language and literacy begins in infancy as babies are programmed from birth to communicate. While the development of language is instinctive, it does require attention, repetition and approval from loved ones to flourish.

We surround the children in our classrooms with books, words, music, and the opportunity to hear people engage in conversation. The children are invited to think out loud during large and small group times, and of course, talk to other children and adults throughout the day. Learning to use and love the power of words at this age is the key to reading later in school, so we immerse our children in a language and print-rich environment to help them get started.

What can parents do? Read to your child at home, sing, chant, listen to music, play word games! Describe what you are doing in detail using rich descriptive vocabulary to expose you children to a varied of words, such as, "I am folding the <u>blue cotton</u> shirt for your sister. It is <u>soft</u> and feels <u>smooth</u>." Delight in what your child has to say! For more ideas, talk to your child's teacher.

#### Classroom News

During the month of November, we will be talking to the children about Clothes. This has been part of your child's daily routine since they were infants. We will dress them with soft and cozy clothes. When your child grows older if you have noticed they are developing their own preferences for the clothes they want to wear. As we study clothes, children will develop finemotor skills as they open buttons, zippers and snaps. These skills will allow your children to dress themselves. They will also develop social skills as they explore clothes along other children.
