Children and Diabetes

Throughout the world, incidences of diabetes are on the rise, and consequently so is diabetes amongst children. Most children are affected by type 1 diabetes in childhood. However, the number of children and young adults affected by type 2 diabetes is beginning to rise, particularly in America.

Approximately 90% of young people with diabetes suffer from type 1 and the number of patients who are children varies from place to place.

A figure of 17 per 100,000 children developing diabetes each year has been reported. As metabolic syndrome, obesity and bad diets spread, so too have the first incidences of type 2 diabetes, previously incredibly rare

The actual causes of the diabetic condition are little understood, in both children and adults. It is widely speculated that diabetes occurred when inherited genetic characteristics are triggered by environmental factors such as diet or exercise. Many type 1 diabetic children do not have diabetes in their

<u>families</u> however, so the exact cause remains a mystery.

Type 2 diabetes amongst children is usually caused by an extremely bad diet from a very young age, coupled with a sedentary lifestyle without exercise.

I found this quote and wanted to share it with you: "The key to raising our kids right is: **positiveness**. They need to see positive, happy parents, who prove that life is worth living for."

According to the website, Parents as a First Teacher, Family members are the first and most important influences in the learning of children at all ages. While parents are usually the strongest models and have the greatest impact; grand-parents, aunts, uncles and family friends also can act as role models, aides, and encouragers. These influences are also often shaped by input from peers, neighbors, teachers and others. See, it really does take a community to raise a child.

Recipes for Fun

mixing ingredients provide preschoolers with math experiences. When children observe the changes in texture etc. science skills are developed. Creative art experiences begin when children (and their parents) actually use the materials that they have created from everyday household ingredients.

No Cook Playdough 2 cups boiling water 3 cups flour 1/2 cup salt 2 tbsp. cooking oil 3 tsp. alum food coloring



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Policy Council Update

A mandatory **Policy Council training** was held on Thursday, October 26th at 9:30am at Lake Sumter State College in Leesburg. The **October Policy Council meeting** started at noon on this date immediately after the mandatory training. Eighteen 2017-18 policy council members were present. Two of the eighteen members in attendance were alternate policy council members. Voting during this meeting was limited to official policy council representatives and alternates from sites that were not represented at the meeting.

The following reports were *discussed*: Budget, Credit Cards, Enrollment/Attendance, Meals and Snacks, Service Areas and Centers.

Policy Council officers for 2017-18 were elected. The new officers are Chairperson - Jonathan Martinez (*Volusia*); Vice-Chairperson- Sheila Ramos (*Volusia*); Secretary - Pat Nohr (*Volusia*); Policy Council Liaison-Jacob Raby (*Hernando*).

Candidates for the following vacancies have been approved for hire: Early Head Start Teacher at Oak Ridge Site (Volusia); Teacher Assistants at Coleman (Volusia), Port Orange-2 (Volusia), Blue Lake Elementary (Volusia); Child Development Specialist (Hernando); Education Manager (Hernando, Sumter and Volusia counties).

Heidi Rand, Director of Early Learning Programs, advised the Policy Council of a recent Information Memorandum from the Office of Head Start that provided guidance for opportunities for programs to respond to the needs of recent hurricane victims. She also reminded the Policy Council of the Parent Activity Fund amount of \$5 per child and discussed the details of the permitted use of the funds.

Budget training will be conducted during the November Policy Council meeting by the Chief Financial Officer of Mid Florida Community Services, Kris Bates.

The School Readiness Committee will meet on Nov. 15th.

Due to the holidays, the November and December Policy Council meetings will be earlier than the regularly scheduled meeting date. The November meeting will be held on November 16th. The December meeting will be held on December 14th. Each of these meetings will be conducted via video conference. Participants will meet at the conference room of the administrative office closest to their county.

The program specialist from the Head Start Region IV Office will be visiting our program in November 14th - 17th.



- .. Teachable Moment #1 During morning reading time, read the book *Hands Are Not for Hitting* by Martine Agassi. For additional activities to do with this book, go to http://csefel.vanderbilt.edu/resources/strategies.html#booknook.
- ..Teachable Moment #2 During breakfast time, intentionally teach the skill of sharing by saying, "Thank you for sharing the syrup with your sister!"
- ..Teachable Moment #3 When your children are playing on the floor quietly, sit on the floor, make eye contact and say, "Wow, you girls have been playing for 10 minutes quietly! Tell me about what you are building." This teaches the desired behavior of playing quietly together.
- ..Teachable Moment #4 When the phone rings. Put the phone down, tap both girls on the shoulder and say, "I am going to be on the phone for 10 minutes. When this timer is done, come tap me on my leg and show me the timer."

Creative Expression Activities to Try:

These types of experiences can help develop meaningful connections

in their developing minds as they move, touch, manipulate different materials and experiment. The following creative expression activity for preschoolers is an ideal way to develop imagination and expand curiosity:

Open-Ended Crafting

Provide a wide range of materials for children to choose from (string, paper plates, popsicle sticks, construction paper, etc.), allowing them to create imaginative crafts using the materials they select instead of objects pre-selected for them. This type of activity provides the opportunity to explore materials and how they work together, and lets children come up with a story behind what they have created.

Kids Science Experiment:

The bouncy egg science experiment Pour the vinegar into the glass Put the egg in the vinegar.

Leave it for at least two days. Keep an eye on it, watch how it changes.

Kids love helping out in the kitchen, and they will enjoy making this crookneck squash pasta salad with you.

Ingredients: 1/2 cup pasta; 1 small crookneck or yellow squash; 1 medium carrot; 1 1/2 cups fresh spinach leaves, washed and dried, and stems removed; 4 oz. low-fat or fat-free cheddar cheese cubed (1 cup)

Directions: Wash hands first; help wash and scrub carrots and squash; help use a salad spinner to wash spinach; dry spinach leaves washed in a colander between sheets of paper towel; wipe up spills; Adults should cook pasta and use a sharp knife to cut all vegetable pieces, make dressing, toss salad.
