Last month was such an awesome month. I would like to thank everyone for your great support. We had a great turn out at last month's parent meeting and the classroom parent engagement activities. You need to give yourself a pat on the back because you are awesome. This month, I wanted to share with you part of a letter I read from the Office of Head Start on attendance.

"We have known for a long time that regular attendance in school is important for children's success. We are now learning how important regular attendance is even in the earliest years. Research suggests that chronic absentee-ism in preschool can predict chronic absenteeism in the later grades and consequent risk for academic underachievement. For example, one study found that about 25 percent of students who were chronically absent in Pre-K and kindergarten were retained in later grades, compared to nine percent of their regularly attending peers¹. That's a big disparity. A child's first educational setting, whether in Head Start, child care, or preschool may be where children begin to form lifelong habits and routines."

Open House is Thursday, October 19, from 3:00 p.m.— 5:00 p.m., please come out to see what your child is learning in class. Also, make sure you get your child's password to log into Galileo Parent Center so you can access up-to-date information about your child's learning and classroom experiences.

I Am Moving, I Am Learning (IMIL)



Getting prechoolers moving can be especially helpful on a rainy day when they cannot go outside to play. Additionally they allow students to work on their gross motor and fine motor skills. These games also often

involve music and allow students to think creatively.

Play several different types of music, and allow the students to get up and dance or move to the music. As you do this, discuss with the children how the music makes them feel and how they can use their movements to reflect the music.

Have the children form a large circle. Choose one child to stand in the middle of the circle. Put on some music. The child in the middle must perform an action to the music such as clapping, marching or toe-tapping. The rest of the group imitates the action. After about 30 seconds, the child in the middle points to a classmate and

switches places with him. The game continues with the new person in the middle choosing an action. Make the game more interesting by introducing the children to a variety of dance moves throughout the year.

Put a twist on the traditional game of musical chairs. Place <u>carpet</u> squares around the room. Make sure there is one square for each child. Play music and ask the children to dance around the room. When the music stops, each child must find a carpet square to sit on. Remove one square and play the music again. As the carpet squares are removed, the children must begin sharing them. See how many children are able to sit down when only a few squares are left. Use hula hoops if carpet squares are not available.



Policy Council Update

The September Policy Council meeting was held on Thursday, September 28th at 10:00am at Lake Sumter State College in Leesburg. Eight 2016-17 policy council members were present. Two community members were present. The Mid Florida Community Services Board of Directors liaison was also present. Numerous members of the Mid Florida Head Start/Early Head Start Administrative Team were present. Several newly elected 2017-18 Policy Council representatives attended. The new representatives could not vote during this meeting because they have not received the Policy Council training yet.

The following reports were *discussed*: Budget, Credit Cards, Enrollment/Attendance, Meals and Snacks, Service Areas and Centers.

The following items were reviewed:

Family Engagement Plan - Several parenting curriculums have been reviewed. One will be selected for our program.

PIR (*Program Information Report*) - Highlights of 2016 -17 Head Start services included a high percentage of well credentialed staff, positive health outcomes and an increased focus on capturing male involvement).

Policy council members were asked about their training needs. Any future training interests or needs should be sent to Family Advocates.

Awards were presented to parents who completed 1 year of service and 3 years of service on the Head Start Policy Council. Kim Ferwin (Spring Hill Center), Adelani Adekunle (Horizon Elem.), James Norton in absentia (Center), Juan Echezebal (Holly Hill Elem.). Community members Chuck Moreau and Jackie Davis also received service awards. A plaque was given to Trevene Christian-(Westside Elem.) for committed service as Head Start Policy Council Chairman. Each recipient gave a short speech highlighting how Policy Council has benefitted them and encouraging new representatives to expect good things from their involvement with Policy Council.

The following announcements were made:

The recent update to Performance Standards allows parents to serve on Head Start/Early Head Start Policy Council for a total 5 years in lifetime. The old term limit was 3 years in lifetime.

Kim Ferwin (Spring Hill Center) was acknowledged for having Perfect Attendance at Policy Council Meetings during 2016-2017 program year.

The program specialist from the Head Start Region IV Office will be visiting our program in November.

The Oct. Policy Council meeting will be held on Thursday, Oct. 26th. The October meeting will be a face to face meeting due to the training that has to be given to new Policy Council members. Halloween Tips

Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks.

- Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.
- Put electronic devices down and keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.
- Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.
- Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible. Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings.
- Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.


Preschool: writing first appears as scribbles drawn in a large circular motion. As your child attempts to write their own name, shapes that resemble letters begin to appear.

Pre-K and Kindergarten: your child may enjoy drawing and labeling objects, using invented spelling with no vowels ("bed" becomes BD). They will write in uppercase lettersmost of them correctly formed- and begin to string separate words together to express more complex thoughts.

Kids Science Experiment:

Grow A Bean Plant. It is simple to grow your own bean plant. You can plant a seed in a cup of dirt and watch for it to come up. However if you'd like kids to see the root and the stem try this experiment. Fold a paper towel and place in a glass jar. Add a few tablespoons of water. Add several beans in the jar touching the paper towel. Watch for several days and add water if your paper towel gets dry.





Ingredients: 1 bag fresh spinach, 1 container of strawberries 1 bottle of raspberry vinaigrette salad dressing

Directions: Rinse spinach and strawberries under cold water and drain well. Remove stems and slice strawberries. Toss together in a bowl, add raspberry vinaigrette dressing. ENJOY!
